

CITIZENS OF FELTON TO UNVEIL MEMORIAL

Dedicated to Fourteen Boys and One Red Cross Nurse Who Were In War

FLAG DEMOBILIZED

Felton, Nov. 17, -- On Saturday, November 22, a \$500 memorial will be unveiled and dedicated by the citizens of Felton borough, in honor of the 14 boys and one Red Cross nurse who were engaged in the World War. A parade forming at the borough school at 1 o'clock, will precede the dedicatory services, after which a banquet will be given the Civil War veterans, and all soldiers, sailors, and nurse in line of parade, in Saylor's hall. Supper will also be for sale at the same place to help bear expenses of the monument. B. S. Sentz, chief burgess of the town, will be chief marshal, and he will have for his aides George H. Warner, H. G. Seitz, Sterling Grim and Clayton Seitz. The borough council will also be mounted. Invitations have been extended to Congressman E. S. Brooks to be present and to Hon. Robert C. Bair of York, who will deliver the oration.

The Knights of Pythias and the Improved Order of Red Men will be in line, and the Red Cross division under Misses Myrtle Eckert and Alma Sentz, will be principal features. The borough schools and those of the adjoining township schools--Lebanon, Mrs. Georgia Stabley, teacher; Felton, Miss Mazie Grim, teacher; Tyson's, Verren Flinchbaugh, teacher; Trinity, William Grim, teacher, have been invited to be in line of the parade.

The manufacturing men of the borough have also signified their intention of having floats, advertising their businesses. Clayton Smith, a returned machine gunner from France, is building a mounted gun, which will be guarded by several Boy Scouts. Miss Elizabeth Sentz will have charge of the high school students and it is expected that all will be in line. Two bands, Felton and Red Lion, will furnish the music.

Through the efforts of Congressman Brooks, 21 eight-inch cannon balls, 14 of which will be placed on top of the shaft, have been secured. The shaft contains a bronze-plate, containing the names of the soldiers and also the nurse's name, which is marked with a cross. The plate contains the following names:

Died in France -- G. Harry Sechrist.

Overseas -- Miss Ella B. Payne, George T. Eckert, Alvin Payne, William Wise, Harvey E. Smith, Edward Stabley, Clayton Smith, Howard Hannigan, J. Paul Flinchbaugh.

Home Service -- Marvin Grove, Spurgeon Grove, H. Clair Sentz.

The base and shaft were made of concrete standing about 18 feet high. Tons of stone were used in the construction and also a carload of fine stone, donated by the M&P Railroad Company. Nathaniel Smith had charge of the work. The memorial stands at the County bridge on land donated to the borough by Mrs. C. I. Saylor.
